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On August 29, 2019, a vehicle crossed the center line of Highway 45 in Mobile County, Alabama and crashed head-on into Meghan Grove's vehicle. Meghan's life was forever changed that afternoon.

After being extricated from her vehicle by emergency responders, she was flown by Life Flight to the Trauma Center at USA Health University Hospital where she was diagnosed with multiple pelvic fractures, a broken elbow, a broken wrist and multiple lacerations. Meghan underwent emergency surgery and spent 18 days in the hospital, followed by 40 days in an inpatient rehabilitation facility. Even after discharge, Meghan continued to require extensive physical therapy. During trial, multiple medical providers, including Meghan's treating orthopedic trauma surgeon, testified about the extent of her life-altering injuries.

The driver who crossed the center line had limited insurance coverage that was insufficient to fully compensate Meghan for the severe injuries and damages she suffered. Accordingly, Meghan sought

compensation from her underinsured motorist coverage – which was provided by State Farm and for which she had paid premiums for many years. The purpose of underinsured motorist coverage is to cover a person for injuries and damages caused by someone who doesn't have enough insurance. State Farm refused to fully compensate Meghan for her injuries and even attempted to blame her – its own insured – for the collision. Throughout the litigation and up until the first morning of trial, State Farm denied that the other driver was at fault, contrary to the physical evidence documented at the scene by investigating law enforcement officers.

Due to State Farm's refusal to fully compensate Meghan, Cunningham Bounds filed a lawsuit against State Farm to force it to pay the underinsured motorist benefits due to Meghan. On October 6, 2022, a Mobile County jury awarded \$6,500,000 against State Farm and in favor of Meghan Grove.

Cunningham Bounds attorneys Robert Mitchell and Lucy Tufts tried the case.

After the multi-day trial, Mr. Mitchell stated, "The jury in this case stood up not only for Meghan Grove but also for corporate accountability in general. State Farm had every opportunity to do the right thing, but it made a deliberate decision to put profits over protecting its own insured. We are extremely pleased for our client, who very much deserved this result, and we are also proud of the jury for having the courage to return a meaningful verdict. Hopefully, this result will change the way State Farm treats its policyholders."

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Water Contamination at Camp Lejeune



Cunningham Bounds is investigating claims on behalf of clients who were exposed to contaminated water at Camp Lejeune, a marine base in Jacksonville, North Carolina. Since the early 1950s, tens of thousands of service members, their families, and civilians were exposed to contaminated water at Camp Lejeune. Exposure to the water has been linked to a variety of cancers, diseases and birth defects.

Congress has passed bipartisan legislation allowing exposed individuals to file claims against the federal government for injuries suffered because of the contaminated water at Camp Lejeune. Claims are open to any person who lived, worked, or was exposed (including *in utero*) to the water at Camp Lejeune for at least 30 days between August 1, 1953, and December 31, 1987.
