The morning that a week-long jury trial was set to begin, Cunningham Bounds finalized a \$5 million settlement for the Estate of Paul E. Hodgson, III. The settlement stemmed from an August 2012 incident in which Mr. Hodgson was crushed to death by two high-density polyethylene (HDPE) pipes that rolled off a flatbed trailer at a Hertz Service Pump & Compressor facility in Theodore, Alabama. Mr. Hodgson was 54 years old when he was killed.

"We hope that holding these companies accountable will give some measure of comfort to the family," said attorney Robert Mitchell of Cunningham Bounds. "This was a devastating event and getting to this point took the family's dedication and courage."

On August 16, 2012, in Canton, Ohio, Cavco, Inc. and AIS, LIC loaded several 50 - foot sections of HDPE pipe onto a flatbed trailer that was bound for Theodore. The trailer was operated by freight handlers JVR Transportation, LIC, and Big Rock Transportation, LIC. Neither the freight handlers nor the driver placed any safety devices on the trailer to secure the top layer of pipe from moving laterally when unstrapped. Shortly after the trailer arrived

at the Hertz facility in Theodore, the driver removed straps from the top layer of pipe without warning personnel that the pipe was not secured. Two of the 1-ton HDPE pipes rolled off the trailer and crushed Mr. Hodgson.

The lawsuit alleged, among other things, that commercial drivers have a responsibility to ensure that unloading areas are safe before unstrapping cargo. Discovery in the lawsuit revealed that the potentially fatal risks of unsecured HDPE pipe were well known to the defendants, but that none of them had implemented any corporate policies or protocols to ensure that the required safety measures were implemented.



Faced with this evidence and an imminent trial, the defendants settled suit.

Lawsuit Filed Against Singing River Health System due to Unfunded Pension Plan





Attorneys with Cunningham Bounds are working with the Biloxi law firm of Reeves & Mestayer to pursue a class action in federal court in Mississippi against Singing River Health System (SRHS) and other defendants related to their failure to properly fund the hospital's pension plan.

Information regarding Singing River's Pension Plan indicates that SRHS has not contributed funds to the Pension Plan since 2009. As a result, both current employees and retirees were given false information about their retirement benefits for years.

As of November 2014, the plan was underfunded by at least \$149 million, said attorney Lucy Tufts of Cunningham Bounds.

"Singing River and those named in this suit need to be held accountable."

Singing River Health System operates two Mississippi hospitals: Singing River Hospital in Pascagoula and Ocean Springs Hospital in Ocean Springs. It also operates a number of community medical clinics throughout the Gulf Coast. SRHS is currently the largest employer in Jackson County, with approximately 2,400 employees and more than 600 retirees.





"This is the first federal suit to be filed against Singing River Health System and its collection of partners," said attorney Lucy Tufts. "We will work tirelessly to fight for everyone who has been affected by this retirement crisis."


- Review personal retirement documentation
